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Students' Needs:	
Academic Needs	School teachers continue to send home to the student "homework packets" to keep up in their academic learning. Providing tutoring for any students not meeting benchmark testing, summative testing, and state mandated testing. Tutoring is provided before or after school. Students that fall behind or are low in their academic areas are tutored by teachers after school.
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	Our physical education instructor is providing lessons that incorporate the social emotion health components. SPED Director and EL Director are meeting more frequently with EL/SPED students to insure academic achievement is addressed and well as their social emotional needs. Paraprofessionals are working with students who struggle academically on an ongoing basis. The School's professional counselor is prepared to advise and to assist with students that may have Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs. This assistance can be through phone, Zoom or in-person, whichever best meets the needs of the student.
